### **Staff News:**

Opportunities to learn and grow

New Library Interns hired in October are starting Monday, November 4. The Library Internships provide an opportunity for students enrolled in higher education to gain hands-on work experience while developing job and customer service skills.

We're hiring two new Library Assistants and recruitment closed on Monday November 4th—there were over 400 hundred applicants.

# **Library Spaces**

On The Move!

The temporary location—officially known as Salem Public Library at Broadway—is currently under construction and the space will be ready for shelving to be installed soon. Meanwhile our Outreach Services to seniors is moving operations to West Salem Branch Library in the next few weeks to be followed quickly by Technical Services. This split in staff work spaces (some at WSBL and some at Broadway) creates interesting logistical and communications problems that the staff are working to figure out.

One of the questions we get most often is about our open hours at West Salem Branch Library and at the temporary Salem Public Library at Broadway site. Staff are giving their input into this via small group discussion during the week of November 4<sup>th</sup> and this work will be reported out at the Library Advisory Board meeting.

### Collections

Collections on the Move!

The contractor for the Seismic project, Howard S. Wright, has given us go ahead to do some onsite storage during the renovation. Current thinking is that as much collection as possible will be stored on-site at Main.

Youth kits, most book club kits, sheet music, ukuleles, Art2Go and oversize adult non-fiction books will not be available at Broadway. These collections are going into storage in November to allow time for returns to be stored together as well.

Most children's and teen shelving will be used at Broadway and the majority of these collections are being stored in December so that the shelves can be installed and ready for use

when Broadway opens. The following Children's and Teen collections will remain available until the Main library closes: recently returned items, New, Hot Reads, OBOB, picture books. Educator cardholders have invited to check out extra materials during November. These items will not be due until we move back to Main and will be hidden in the catalog to prevent holds. This way our materials are still in use in the community while we are under construction!

Community Development has graciously volunteered to host a historic run of Salem City Directories for the duration of construction. They will allow access, by appointment. In addition, they will be storing our Ben Maxwell photo collection and our Oregon Historic Photographs Collection.

#### **Events**

Spooky Fun!

October 26th was one of the biggest days of the spooky month for the Library. Teen Advisory Board members (with help from Senior Librarian Sonja Somerville) provided a fun, Haunted House on Saturday, breaking previous attendance records. In the Children's area, a Halloween themed craft table was busy all day, and Therapy Dogs (one in costume!) enjoyed the attention of children reading to them. The Seismic Open House happened at the same time at the Haunted House to see if we could reach more and varied kinds of library users. Lots of great comments, input, and conversations came out of this event for the Design Build team and extended into conversations and information sharing at the SPD's Halloween Dress Rehearsal from 4-6pm that day. Community comments gathered at the Open House are included in the agenda packet.

Circulation staffers Bridget Rogers, Andy Alvarez, Lindsey Carlson and Karen Kinzie painted hundreds of faces at the Police Halloween Safety Event on Saturday, Oct 26 from 4-6 pm. The total attendance for the event was over 1500 community trick or treaters. Many thanks to the face painters for their enthusiasm and artistic skills.

Seismic + Art

Art is one of the big discussions with the Seismic project right now as the Public Art portion of the Bond has a request for proposals going out soon. Members of Salem Public Art Commission (SPAC) and the Salem Public Library Foundation (SPLF) have been a part of these discussions as have Hacker Architects and the project managers from Public Works. The current art collection has been taken down and is being stored in a facility specifically for art and SPLF and SPAC partnered on that as well.
