# Make a Difference in YOUR Neighborhood

When a neighborhood is well-cared for, it shows. Organizing a beautification project is an excellent way to get to know your neighbors while increasing the safety, beauty, and livability of your neighborhood. It doesn't hurt property values either.

This beautification booklet explains resources the City of Salem can provide for various kinds of projects.

# 1. Choose a Project



What does your neighborhood need? Is there a playground that could use some extra

attention? Maybe there is a particular area plagued by litter. Perhaps some education needs to happen around proper use of a stream or storm drain. Talk to your neighbors to help you decide what would work best in your neighborhood. Attend your Neighborhood Association meetings, they are wealth of information!

# 2. Coordinate with the City

The City staff listed in each section can help you plan a safe, timely and properly equipped project. We love to work with you. Also, make sure to get a volunteer sign in sheet so you can keep track of your volunteers.

# 3. Make it Happen

Invite Your Neighbors! City of Salem Neighborhood Services can provide a packet of invitations for you to deliver to neighbors. Staff will make your invitation specific about what time and place to meet, types of tasks, how to dress, tools needed, minimum age (if applicable), food and water provisions, etc. Staff can even help advertise your project.

#### Go to your Neighborhood Association Meeting.

#### Contact local businesses to find out if they might be able to

donate snacks or provide additional resources to support your project.



- **Be inspired by local efforts.** Over the years, Salem neighborhood associations have coordinated a variety of unique projects including:
  - SESNA, Highland and NESCA neighbors schedule regular litter pick-ups at their neighborhood school and along the streets.
  - Volunteers in West Salem organized clean-ups over a series of weekends focusing on garbage and junk hauling, bush and tree branch trimming, lawn mowing and edging and painting of a neighborhood house.
  - Grant and NEN have sponsored Spring clean-up days with free dumpsters provided by local businesses. In NEN, a neighborhood rummage sale was held on the same day and funds raised went back into the community.
  - Northgate neighbors identified a house in need of paint. The owner was unable to afford the work, but neighbors successfully applied for a SOLV grant (www.solv.org) to

pay for the paint and volunteered to do the work together.

**Talk to your neighbors.** Find out what's important to them while making connections and finding support for potential projects.


If you see someone applying graffiti, call 911 immediately! Report all other graffiti to the 24-hour Graffiti Hotline at 503-371-4264. Before removing any graffiti, take a picture of it and write down its exact location and approximate size. Send the picture to graffiti@cityofsalem.net. Remember not to remove or cover graffiti without the property owner's permission.

# Grime Prevention Information

Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design (CPTED) suggests the arranging of buildings and open spaces can either encourage or discourage crime.

Criminals generally seek the path of least resistance and CPTED principles can deter them. Things like natural surveillance



(trimming bushes and trees in front of windows so no one can hide behind them gaining access) and access control (designing a yard in a way that directs visitors to the proper entrance and away from private areas) can help. Plus, a wellmaintained yard shows a would-be criminal that someone cares about the property and creates an unfriendly environment for them to prowl.

Residents and business owners with security cameras can now register their exterior surveillance systems with the Salem Police Department's new Surveillance Camera Registration & Mapping program. #### Neighborhood Parks

Helping to take care of your neighborhood parks is a great way to spruce up your neighborhood, get to know your neighbors and make your parks safer, more enjoyable places.

Whether you are interested in planning a onetime event or in making a longer-term commitment by signing up as a Park Partner, there are many opportunities available through Parks Maintenance Management to make a difference in your

park including:

- Maintaining or restoring trails
- Checking and painting play equipment
- Removing invasive species
- Picking up litter and yard debris
- Painting over graffiti
- Cleaning picnic tables and other hard surfaces



# Fire Hydrant Painting

You can help keep the City's fire hydrants visible and safe with a fresh coat of paint. All equipment to scrape, clean, and paint the hydrants are provided.

## Storm Drain Marking

Help keep pollutants out of our streams by marking storm drains with the "Dump No Waste-Drains to Streams" message. This is



a great summer or early fall activity for ages eight and up (adult supervision is required for younger volunteers). This project can be planned as a one-time or on-going event. Supplies are provided by the City of Salem.

# Creek Clean Ups

Cleaning debris from the stream in your neighborhood not only makes it look nicer, but also makes it a healthier habitat for



wildlife. Adult volunteers are encouraged to work with a Public Works project on coordination to plan a one-time event or series of clean ups during the summer or early fall. The project coordinator

can help with safety considerations and special equipment available for your creek or stream.

# Leaf Ranger

Keeping leaves out of the storm drains make them work more efficiently and avoids the winter problem of clogged storm drains and lake-size puddles in the street. Volunteers ages six and up (adult supervision is required for younger volunteers) are encouraged to spend a few hours each month raking leaves away from the curbs and catch basins during the fall and winter. Be sure to wear bright-colored clothes and be aware of traffic.

# Adopt-A-Street

This Public Works program enables groups and individuals to take charge of a chosen street section and organize litter pickups or mural. Your commitment is publicized with

# Litter Pick-Up

If you and your neighbors would like to spend a few hours picking up trash along streets in your neighborhood, the Public Works Department can provide you with trash bags (they'll even pick them up when you're done), gloves, safety vests, litter sticks and orange and black "Volunteer Litter Pick Up" signs for your safety. # Traffic Circle Beautification

Salem's traffic circles (also called "roundabouts") rely on volunteers. If you are interested in helping to beautify a traffic circle near you, the City can provide safety equipment and signs.
