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## <u>Introduction</u>

- 34 possible questions
- Available electronically (via Qualtrics) and hard-copy (paper survey)
- 1008 surveys started, but only 824 were complete enough to keep for analyses
- 208 paper surveys completed (~25% of all responses) and almost all of them indicated they are currently experiencing homelessness





# <u>Definition of</u> Discrimination


#### For this survey, we will use the following definition:

"Discrimination is when someone is treated unfairly or differently because of their age, race, color, national origin, language spoken, gender, gender identity, sexual orientation, religion, marital/parental/familial status, mental or physical disability, weight or body type, veteran status, income, or housing status."




# Over Quota of People Currently Experiencing Homelessness

208 out of 824 respondents currently experiencing homelessness




That is 24%!

# The respondents were spread across all age groups. 40% of respondents were between the ages of 40-59.



# **Demographics of Respondents**




The majority of the survey respondents were white, (64%).

#### 62% of respondents were women.




# <u>Demographics of Respondents</u> (Cont'd)




~16% of respondents identified as a member of the LGBTQIA+ community.



Salem is a very peaceful city and as a rule people are very accepting of others who are different.

I've lived in places that had a lot more discrimination.


#### Poor/Failing Rating

In my work and groups that I participate with, [discrimination] is seen widely and every day.

My neighbors are also quite racist.

Blatant racist discrimination occurs daily in Salem, and the local law enforcement and the powers that be encourage it. We have a member of the Three Percenters on our school board, and the Proud Boys are allowed to walk around public parks with open containers of alcohol and firearms. White supremacists are allowed to harass anyone they like with no consequences. This is the image of Salem we present to the world, and it is an accurate one.

# Quotes from Individuals Experiencing Homelessness

#### Poor/Failing Rating


We are targeted daily with insults, car noise, and sometimes actual violence.

Discrimination happens daily. Men are attacked often as they sleep. A woman I know was raped three times in two days. Another woman was raped by three men. None of the attackers were homeless.

- Homeless Respondents less aware




## Awareness Decrease By Demographics



#### **Decreased Awareness**



#### Increased Avenues of Awareness





# Comfort in Reporting a Bias Crime

#### Majority aren't comfortable

- 74% of hardcopy respondents were not comfortable reporting
- 44% of online respondents were not comfortable reporting



# Reasons *for not* Reporting a Bias Crime



Theme	% of Comments	Respondent Quotes
Police are biased	17%	I have witnessed bias from Salem police countless times. Towards the Igbtqia community, leftist protests vs right wing protests, brutality towards mentally ill civilians, criminalizing homelessness, etc.
Nothing would happen	15%	We are not believed, and nothing happens when we've made reports.
Bad experience with police	14%	Hell no! I would not report! When I went to the cops, they wanted to lock ME up!


# Reasons for Reporting a Bias Crime




Theme	% of Comments	Respondent Quotes
Trust the police	24%	I have a high level of trust in our police department and its leadership. I believe they want to do the right thing and have policies and processes in place.
Here to serve and protect	21%	The police are skilled and extremely aware of how to handle any bias crime.
I am white	18%	I am comfortable with the police perhaps because I'm a property owner and white.

# Discriminating Against Disability

- 66% people who are experiencing homelessness and live with a disability
- 27% of online respondents live with a disability
- Higher rate of minority groups live with a disability
