- We will also be looking at moving our general meeting to in person meetings more to follow on that subject. We are currently looking for a location.






Salem Community Improvement Bond




Community Improvement Bond: 2022


- General Obligation Bond
- Up to \$300 million for 10 years
- Keeps a level bond tax levy rate without increasing the City's property tax rate
- Funds major capital needs for 10 years

Community Improvement Bond: 2022



Fire Engines and Equipment: \$26 million

- Replace fire engines, ladder trucks
- Purchase vehicles for:
 - Heavy and light rescue; aircraft rescue and firefighting, air support
 - Wildland/grass fire
 - Paramedics
- Purchase rescue tools like "jaws of life", defibrillators



Future Fire Stations: \$14 million


- Provide two new fire stations for more timely response.
- Would be focused on northeast and southeast to improve response times; precise locations TBD.



Fire Station #7, 2006 Fire Bond

Civic Center: \$39.5 million

- Civic Center earthquake safety.
- 50-year-old building needs renovation to meet earthquake standards and improve accessibility.
- Similar to recent Salem Public Library project.
- Protect community members in the event of an earthquake.



Salem Civic Center Atrium

Technology and Cybersecurity: \$17.6 million

Every aspect of City of Salem service to residents and businesses is reliant on technology.

- Need up-to-date and fail-safe cybersecurity.
- Install backup fiber network and data storage, and replace aging technology.
- Replace old financial reporting system.

Parks Upgrades: \$28.4 million

Our ageing park facilities need updates. The bond would also fund portions of existing community-driven master plans for individual parks.

- Rehab playgrounds, paths, tennis/pickleball courts
- Replace restrooms
- Build new park facilities like playgrounds, event spaces, dog parks, trails, and sports fields



Nelson Park

Streets and Sidewalks: \$157 million

Transportation demands exceed available funding.

A list of priority projects was developed with input from hundreds of community members These include:

- Street Upgrades --sidewalks, streetlights, bike lanes and street connectivity
- Construct Marine Drive NW-- from Harritt to 5th, with multi-use path connection to Wallace Marine Park
- Rehabilitate or replace aging streets and bridges
- Install safer crossings, sidewalks and bicycle routes

Affordable Housing

Strategic investments in new permanent affordable housing and temporary shelter

- Affordable Housing Opportunity Fund: \$10 million
- Sites for mixed use affordable housing and two branch libraries: \$7.5 million




