

Friends of Trees Planting Orchard Heights Park






West Salem Urban Renewal Area



West Salem Branch Library: A Brief Chronology

September, 1955	The West Salem Parent-Teacher Association makes a proposal to the Salem City Council to establish a branch library in the old West Salem City Hall on Edgewater.
May, 1956	Salem voters approve local option levy that includes \$30,000 to fund a West Salem Branch Library.
October, 1957	West Salem Branch Library opens for the first time. The library is open six days a week, a total of 27 hours, including until 9 pm on Mondays.
1960	West Salem's population is 3,897
August, 1965	"Story hour" programs for pre-school and older children begin with volunteer readers.
October, 1966	The library hours are now 24 per week $-$ 2 pm to 6 pm, Monday through Saturday.
July, 1973	Library hours are expanded to 44 hours a week, Monday through Saturday, including two evenings until 9 am.
June, 1976	Failure of a local option levy threatens library with closure. Instead hours are reduced to five days a week from 12:30 pm to 5 pm, a total of 22 ½ per week.
1978	West Salem's population is 9,930

September, 1995	New West Salem Branch Library opens. Library is open 40 hours per week — six days a week including three evenings until 8 pm.
February, 1996	Willamette Valley floodwaters come within three feet of inundating the new library.
2000	West Salem's population is 17,995
May, 2012	Library is open 31 hours per week. The City proposes to cut hours to six per week.
July 2012	Library open 16 hours per week.
July 2016	Library open 31 hours per week.
November 2017	Library open 31 hours per week.
September 2020	Library closed.
2021	West Salem's population is 30,212.
December 2021	Library closed.
May 2022	Library open two days a week, 8 hours. No evening hours or children's programming.
December 2022	Library open four days a week, 19 hours. No evening hours or children's programming.

Branch Library Hours in Comparable Oregon Cities in 2022

Bend (pop. 99,178)

East Bend Branch: Mon-Sat, 9 to 6, except 10 to 6 on Friday. Total = 53 hours.

Beaverton (pop. 97,494)

Murray Scholls Branch: Mon-Weds, 10 to 7; Thurs-Sun, 10 to 6. Total = 59 hours.

Eugene (pop. 176,654)

Bethell Branch: Mon-Sat 10 to 6, except 10 to 8 on Tues. Total = 50 hours.

Sheldon Branch: Same as Bethell. Total = 50 hours.

Hillsboro (pop. 111,909)

Shute Park Branch: Mon-Sun, 10 to 6. Total = 56 hours.

Brookwood Branch: Mon-Thurs, 10 to 8; Sat, Sun, Fri, 10 to 6. Total = 64 hours.
