Prohibits municipality that administers and enforces building inspection program from adopting construction standards or methods from Reach Code, or similar or related code of standards and methods, that exceed or are more stringent than statewide standards and methods Director of Department of Consumer and Business Services adopts and administers.

1/21/2023 - HB 2195 would prohibit the City from adopting construction standards from the Reach Code or other codes that exceed the standards adopted by the State. The Climate Action Plan calls for the City to adopt a "stretch Net Zero energy building code or highly energy-efficient voluntary green energy standard for new homes and buildings."

1/18/2023 - HB 2659 would require the Land Conservation and Development Commission to amend or replace the Climate-Friendly and Equitable Communities rules by January 1, 2028, and such rules could not be adopted unless 80 percent of the governing bodies of all affected local jurisdictions supported them. The amended or new rules would have to include model ordinances and allow for consideration of local projects, plans, and capacities. Salem is in the process of implementing the new State rules, which include parking reforms and updating the Transportation System Plan. The rules align with the Our Salem project and Climate Action Plan.

The bill would ensure the State could not preempt the City from adopting such rules. The Climate Action Plan has a strategy to implement policies to "reduce natural gas usage, such as requiring all-electric new construction, prohibiting fossil fuel usage in new construction, and/or banning the use of gas and oil in residential appliances."

2/3/2023 - This bill creates the Oregon Disaster Recovery Authority - a new body with oversight and powers granted to them during Governor declared emergencies. This Authority is appointed by the Governor and adds another layer of direction, oversight and authority to the state. It is unknown if this Authority would enhance response to disasters from a local perspective, or if it would hinder local authority to conduct emergency management operations. This would change processes by which the city would work the state during Governor declared emergencies.

Allows conversion of building from commercial use to workforce housing within urban growth boundary.

1/18/2023 - HB 2984 would require the City to allow any commercial building to convert into workforce housing - available to families with incomes less than 120 percent area median income (AMI) regardless of zoning. The workforce housing would have to have an affordability restriction for 15 years. Housing that is affordable (80 percent of AMI or average of less than 60 percent AMI) can already be developed almost anywhere in the city. This bill would extend that opportunity to workforce housing.

Relating to economic development; declaring an emergency.

Directs Oregon Business Development Department to develop grant and loan program to support businesses applying for financial assistance under Creating Helpful Incentives to Produce Semiconductors for America Act of 2022 (P.L. 117-167).

2/27/2023 - SB 4 is one of the Governor's Semi-Conductor Bills. The majority of the SB 4 deals with funding programs and outlining application processes etc. to allow for funding tied to development of semi-conductor facilities. Overall, this makes sense for the city to be supportive of SB 4. However, under SB 4, the governor would have the authority, via executive order, to bring land into urban growth boundaries (UGBs) to accommodate industrial uses related to the semiconductor industry. This would supersede the State's land use rules. If the land is not substantially developed by June 2027, it would be removed from the UGB. The bill calls out specific cities that the governor shall consider in designating sites, and Salem is not listed.

Relating to municipal solid waste incinerators.

Requires municipal solid waste incinerator that accepts more than specified amounts of hospital, medical or infectious waste in calendar year to meet federal emissions limits for hospital, medical or infectious waste incinerator.

2/24/2023 - SB 488 would require that any municipal solid waste incinerator that accepts hospital, medical, or infectious waste (medical waste) at an annual average rate of more than 200 lbs/hr meet the federal emissions standards for an HMIWI (Hospital, medical or infectious waste incinerator). Covanta Marion accepted over 16,355 tons of medical waste in 2022, an annual average of 3,734 lbs/hr. Discontinuing disposal of medical waste at Covanta would likely lead to an increase in disposal cost for Salem haulers and increased garbage rates for Salem residents. Alternatively, approval of SB 488 could reduce disposal options for the regional waste shed, shortening the life of remaining disposal options.

1/18/2023 - SB 580 would require the Land Conservation and Development Commission to amend or replace the Climate-Friendly and Equitable Communities rules by January 1, 2028, and such rules could not be adopted unless 80 percent of the governing bodies of all affected local jurisdictions supported them. The amended or new rules would have to include model ordinances and allow for consideration of local projects, plans, and capacities. Prevents local governments from prohibiting natural gas use in or availability for new or existing residential or commercial buildings.

1/18/2023 - Removes local control for implementing restrictions on natural gas in commercial and residential applications. The City's Climate Action Plan targets natural gas as a high priority for reducing green house gas emissions. While no policy has been proposed or developed by the City to address NG usage, the City should retain the authority to do so to meet its climate goals.

2/27/2023 - Oregon has worked for a number of years to enhance the ability to fight crimes against animals. Funds have been increased for training, partnerships and forensic evidence collection. Where we have not made gains, is in law enforcement's ability to prosecute those responsible for committing these crimes. This bill would provide effective and ongoing funding of an Oregon DOJ attorney to specifically prosecute these crimes. Currently, the funding for this attorney is through grants. While

Relating to the possession of firearms in certain public areas.

Authorizes governing bodies of certain public entities that own or control public building to adopt policy, ordinance or regulation or precluding affirmative defense for possession of firearms in public building and adjacent grounds by concealed handgun licensees.

2/1/2023 - HB 2007 authorizes governing bodies of certain public entities that own or control public buildings to adopt regulations prohibiting possession of firearms in public buildings and adjacent grounds. Under current law, local control over firearms in public buildings is pre-empted. This proposal provides for more local control in restricting access to firearms in public buildings.

Relating to traffic safety.

Authorizes all cities to elect to operate photo radar if city pays costs of operating photo radar.

1/17/2023 - HB 2095 clarifies and broadens the ability of cities to enact photo radar programs. To improve traffic safety and reduce crashes, the Salem Police Department already employs both a photo red light and speed on green automated traffic enforcement program. Photo radar is one of the most influential tools to help change behaviors and keep our street safe. We have experience using this tool to change behaviors.

Allowing cities to reduce speed limits in specified areas is beneficial to local governments. The City has recently reduce speed limits on problematic streets. This bill would allow for greater discretion by local governing bodies for traffic safety measures.

Creates income or corporate excise tax credit for investment in affordable housing, available to taxpayer eligible for federal low-income housing credit, and allocated by Housing and Community Services Department.

1/27/2023 - HB 2563 creates income or corporate excise tax credit for investment in affordable housing available to taxpayer eligible for federal low-income tax credit and allocated by Oregon Housing and Community Services Department. As one of Oregon's severely rent burdened communities, Salem's City Council is interested in increasing access to and the number of affordable housing units within our community.

It could improve chances to preserve more of the expiring projects and provide additional protections for residents that end up converting similar to Orchard Park. One of the most important impacts to the tenants in this legislation is the notification requirements. Tenants would be notified 30 months in advance of the removal of affordability restrictions. It would also establish a 3-year safe harbor period protecting rent increases post transition. This bill has been endorsed by the Housing Alliance and is as a priority for SHA.

Increases amount residential landlord owes tenant for landlord-cause termination of tenancy.

1/20/2023 - SB 611 would increase amount residential landlord owes tenant for landlord-cause termination of tenancy. This legislation increases the relocation fee for tenants who are asked to move without cause from an amount equaling one month rent to an amount equaling three month's rent. The bill also limits the rent increases allowed to once every 12 months and limited to the provisions outlined in ORS 90.324 (7% + CPI).. This bill has been labeled the "rent reasonableness" bill. This measure has been labeled a priority with Housing Alliance and will be advocated heavily this session as an eviction prevention measure. It is likely SHA will provide support for this measure.
