MEETING OVERVIEW

This was the second meeting of the Equity Roundtable, which is comprised of representatives of organizations that serve traditionally underserved communities. The purpose was to identify, discuss, and prioritize different ideas of how the City could minimize or avoid displacement of residents. Staff also recapped the input provided during the first meeting and sought feedback to make any further changes to the map depicting areas that are at risk of displacement.

Josh Mahar, Julie Warncke, and Eunice Kim gave a presentation that focused on the following (presentation slides attached):

- What we heard from the Equity Roundtable in March
 - Julie and Eunice provided a summary of the input from the first Equity Roundtable meeting, including reasons for displacement, areas at risk of displacement, and other comments and concerns

- Roundtable participants then provided input as to other changes that should be made to the displacement risk map.
 - The following areas should be shown as vulnerable to displacement:
 - All of east Salem
 - Wallace Road NW
 - Commercial Street SE (near Wiltsey Rd SE and south)
 - West Salem (except inner West Salem and along Wallace Road NW) should be shown as exclusive

• Strategies to address displacement

 Eunice discussed different approaches to minimizing or avoiding displacement, including regulatory, financial, and land strategies. She then provided examples of each type of approach. These examples were written on large flip boards.

GROUP DISCUSSION

Roundtable participants provided additional ideas for how the City could minimize, mitigate, or avoid displacement. Their ideas are provided below. The participants were each given three dots and asked to indicate their top strategies. Their votes are shown in red below.

Regulatory

- Allow multifamily housing and affordable housing in more areas
- Reduce design requirements for multifamily housing
- Provide more incentives for mixed-income developments
 - o Try for inclusionary zoning
- Address/monitor the definition of affordable housing
- Fast track affordable housing projects

Financial

- Provide more rental assistance first and last month, and other assistance
- Provide resources/financial assistance and help navigating the process to help develop housing
- Provide foreclosure/mortgage assistance
- Preserve existing low-income homes
- Leverage foreclosure for vulnerable populations

Land

- Purchase land for housing development ••••
- Partner with churches and nonprofits on housing
- Promote land trusts create ownership opportunity for tenants
- Create community hubs/centers in multifamily developments
 - Community spaces or rooms

Other •

- Improve transit access and frequency
- Create mixed-income neighborhoods
- Provide a free trolley to help access services (similar to Monmouth)
- Address stigma related to multifamily and affordable housing
 - Acknowledge the impact reference to Brown & Black populations
- Provide tenant-based strategies (i.e. manufactured home purchase by tenant)

- Support partnerships between market/developers and organizations so they can lead cultural-specific supports and services
 - City should conduct trainings
 - o Community centers/services should be provided on site
- Understand the order of strategies/investments
 - o Bike lanes and Whole Foods can signal or lead to displacement
- Consider climate/heat impacts Air conditioning is not just a luxury, it's a need
- Address barriers with neighborhood associations
 - o They need to be more inclusive
 - They need to buy into this work
- Consider impacts of allowing businesses where homes are
 - Could lead to displacement
 - o Education is needed, as home businesses can be an opportunity
- Unhoused population concerns

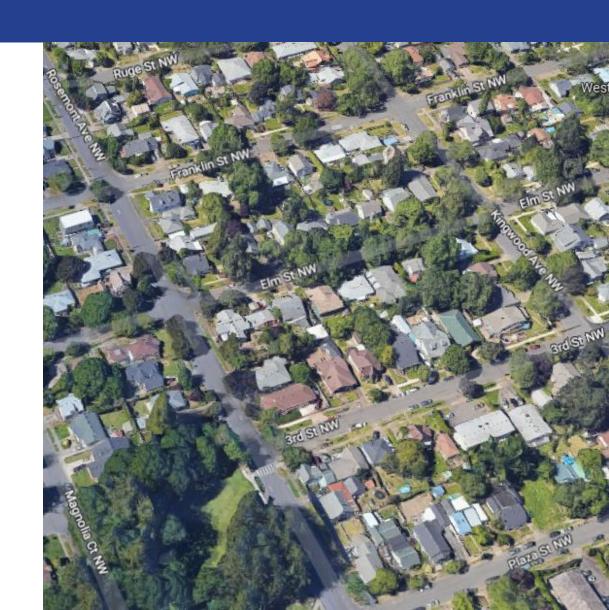

 - Increasing rents pushing people out further northeast and out of Salem
 - Area with greatest need for rental assistance
- Inner West Salem
- Inner Southeast near 13th and Mission Street
- Area in Southeast Salem near Sunnyside

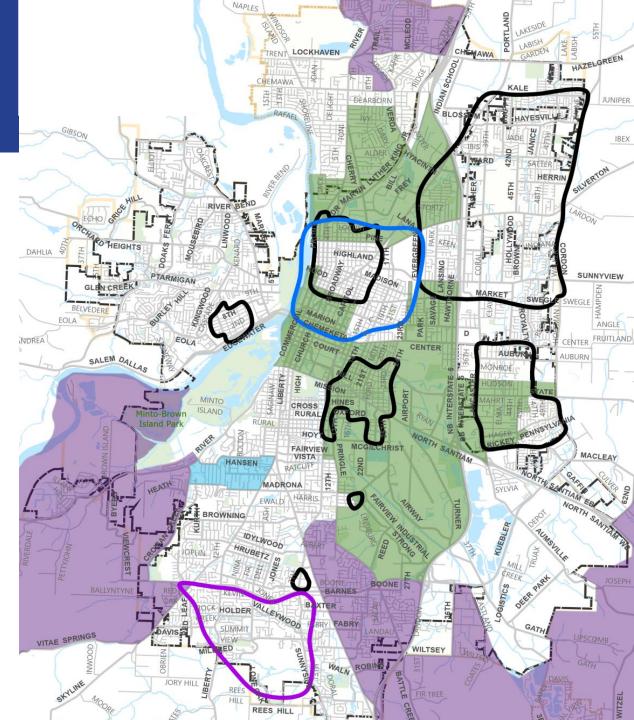

Reasons for Risk

- Rent increases with or without new developments or public improvements
- Safety and security concerns
- Lack of transportation safety

- Schools must be included in the discussion



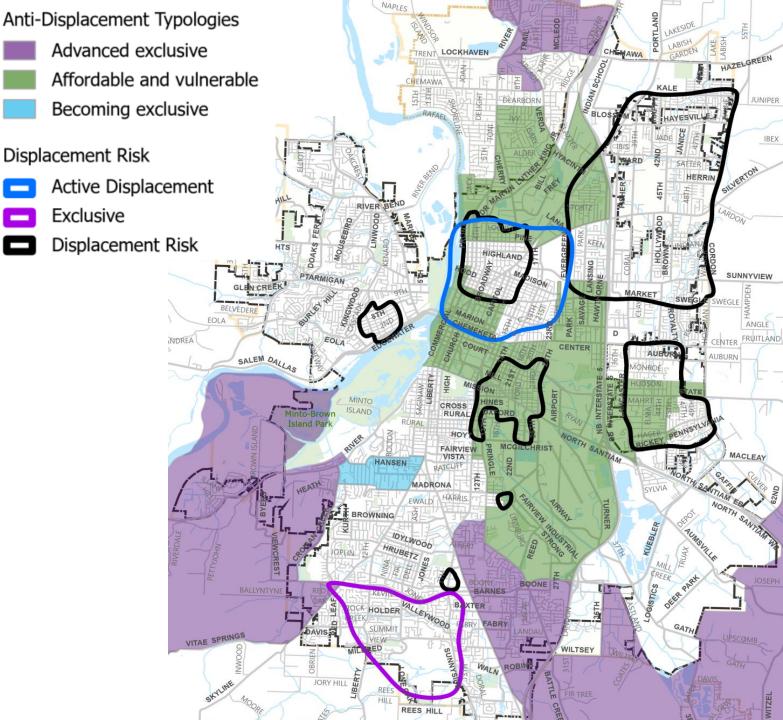
Other Concerns and Comments

- Lack of lighting is an issue



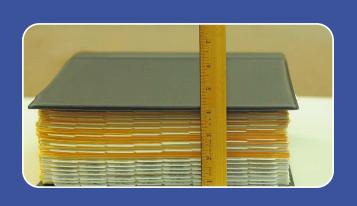

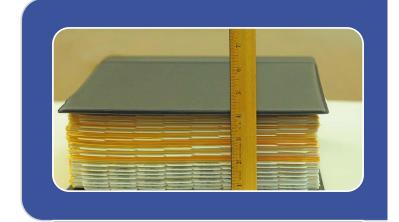

Regulatory

 Create new zoning incentives or reduce zoning barriers to developing housing

Examples

- Allow multifamily as a permitted use in more areas
- Reduce design requirements for multifamily housing

Financial



Financial

 Create financial incentives or program to support development

Examples

- Provide tax abatement for transit-supportive housing (Multi-Unit Housing Tax Incentive Program includes affordability requirement)
- Exempt affordable housing from system development charges

Land



Land

Secure land for the development of housing

Examples

 Purchase vacant or underutilized land and provide/sell it for housing development

Other Strategies

Examples: Improve transit access and frequency



Roundtable Ideas to Reduce Risk

- Help people where they are in north and northeast while adding affordable housing in west and south Salem
 - Create more mixed-income neighborhoods
- Tie strategies to prevent rent increases with public investments
- Locate community centers in areas of risk
- Work with churches to provide temporary housing
- Improve transit access and frequency
- Consider low-cost ride share options

Preservation and Production

Strategies can aim to:

- Preserve existing housing
- Produce more housing
