Staff News

Adult Services Librarian Alexis Fritz-Stibbe resigned in May to focus more time on her growing family. The position is ready to be posted and awaiting for the next steps via the Human Resources Recruitment Team.

The Community Engagement Senior Librarian interviews were conducted in May and we had many strong candidates. An offer will be extended the first full week of June.

Karen Fischer, Youth Services Supervisor, retired after 30 years with the Salem Public Library. Interviews for her position, now renamed as "Outreach & Programming Supervisor", have concluded and we have selected Sonja Somerville to fill the position. Sonja has been working in Youth Services for the last 12 years and prior to that was a Community Relations Coordinator for the

Salem Public Library Foundation for 8 years. Sonja has also served in multiple committees including our own Communications, Programming and Outreach, and Strategic Planning teams. Sonja's dedication, knowledge, and passion for serving our community and libraries makes her the perfect fit for this position.

The library welcomed a new full time Youth Services Librarian Assistant, Sarah Diaz Fregoso. Sarah is bilingual, has customer service experience, graduated from the University of Oregon with a BS in Earth Sciences and Geography. While in college, she was a student research assistant for the Vertebrate Paleontology Lab.



Adult Services Senior Librarian Alice MacGougan attended the quarterly meeting of the Neighborhood Association Chairs on June 29. Many NA Chairs were in attendance as the mayor convened the meeting and different city departments took turns sharing their news. She made connections with Salem Housing Authority and Center 50+ and learned about what is happening in Salem.

Collections

The Playaway Launchpad collection will be moving to 'holdable' status to better fit the needs of the community. This change is focused on increasing access to the whole launchpad collection for our patrons. With the tablets being geared towards serving certain age levels and skills, it could be a bit difficult for patrons to find exactly what they are looking for without having the option to place a hold. Making these holdable would help close the selection gap for people.

The Library of Things have been growing in holds! Each week has seen a jump in circulation and holds for items. Currently there are over 20 items on the hold shelf and over 800 checkouts total.

Projects and Programs

Alice MacGougan conducted two sessions of training with library staff providing a refresher on our meeting and study room software product. Staff and the public use this tool daily for library space reservations.

Jessica Marie, Youth Services Senior Librarian, wrapped up the R.E.A.D. 1st Grade Bookmobile outreach with 3 final visits to elementary schools. Jessica, along with Librarian Dan Johnson will also be visiting the R.E.A.D. Migrant Education Summer School program, hosted for a second year in a row by Gubser elementary, which will enable participating students to check out books, get library cards, participate in the library's Summer Reading Challenge remotely, and earn prizes. Both programs are in partnership with the Assistance League of Salem-Keizer.

Youth Services staff also provided several group tours for Salem-area grade schools, providing tours, storytimes, library introduction, and scavenger hunts.

Library staff continue to provide personalized reading suggestions through the library's Book Match service. Here is a response from a Library Media Assistant from a local middle school demonstrating how the library is helping support literacy in the summer.



Additionally, it's important to note the overwhelming support we received from library staff, the city, and the community.

Salem Public Library will be kicking off its annual all-ages Summer Reading Challenge on June 6th with a preschool performance by Rick Huddle. Providing a special program at the beginning of the summer enables staff to get many of the pre-readers and caregivers signed up for the challenge prior to school ending for the summer.

Library staff anticipate a busy summer reading program filled with activities, events, and community outreaches.

The library outreach van has had its wrap completed and is ready to take out into the community. The van will attend pop-up library events and outreaches. The van's debut program attendance will be the Angel Ocasio Summer Reading performance in Riverfront Park!

Strategic Plan Updates

The Equity, Diversity, Inclusion, and Belonging team finalized the general action plan steps in May. It was determined that focusing on Recruitment & Retention was the most pressing thing, so team leads met with leadership to talk about the plans for this. Sharing out the staff survey is to come.

The City of Salem recently conducted an employee engagement survey which showed that 69.8% of employees feel engaged/almost engaged in the organization. Library specific results will be known at a later date.
