SEPTEMBER 18 WORK SESSION ON BUDGET

The City Council adopted the FY 2024 budget on June 26,

2023. The budget was adopted with the understanding that if new revenues did not materialize, it would need to be amended. This work session is to discuss potential reduction scenarios for during the forecast period. City Council will hold discussion regarding the General Fund including: fund balance after the closing of FY 2023, proposed service cuts, and direction to staff on preparation of a FY 2024 supplemental budget.

YMCA VETERANS HOUSING RIBBON-CUTTING CEREMONY

In 2019, with the leadership of Senator Peter Courtney, we secured funds through the Oregon legislature to build a 34-unit Veterans Housing complex to support Veterans with a permanent affordable housing option.

Apartment options offer one-and two-bedroom units which range from 400 square feet to 750 square feet. Each unit comes equipped with a washer/dryer, and the building has an elevator for full access to every floor for those with physical disabilities.

This apartment complex is owned by the Withnell Family YMCA (I'm a proud member of their Board of Directors) and is overseen by Oregon Department of Veterans' Affairs.

CITY OF SALEM NAVIGATION CENTER UPDATE

Of the 60 program beds, we have 40 filled, with a plan to continue to add 5 a week until we get to 60.

We will be close to full occupancy by September.

The other 15 beds are "diversion beds," which are designed for short-term stays (day or two for law enforcement referrals

Mid-Willamette Valley Community Action Agency (MWVCAA) is not activating those until we get the program beds full.

Congratulations on the SCAN Street Mural Project!

City is working with 10 Neighborhood Associations for new street mural sites.

The City's Public Art Commission has volunteered to help connect neighbors to artists.

Salem Park Improvement Fund (SPIF)

Funding opportunity for Salem's neighborhood associations (NAs)

City Council typically provides \$60,000 in SPIF funds each year

Proiects must be approved by City staff and consistent with Salem Comprehensive Park System Master Plan polices

How the Partnership Works:

- NA identifies a project within one of their parks
- City staff works with the NA to ensure feasible
- Projects selected by the SPIF Project Review Committee
- City awards up to 75% of funds needed to construct the project
- SPIF project cycles run for a 2-year period

- Funded acquisition of a new park, approximately 2.9 acre
- Developer to provide "pre-development": grading, street frontage (e.g., sidewalks, street trees), looped walking path, and rough lawn seeding

Proposed Fabry Natural Area

• Funded acquisition of a new natural area park, approximately 5.6 acre

• Developer to provide "pre-development": grading, restoration, walking path, and outdoor classroom adjacent to Pringle Creek Elementary

Rees Park Playground

• Play equipment replacement in 2024

Sumpter Park Sports Court

• Planning for multi-use court rehabilitation to start this fall with improvements occurring in 2024 or 2025

5. Jim Scheppeke - Dolly Parton Imagination Library

Problem: Less that half of third graders in south Salem elementary schools passed the state reading test in 2022. All Salem-Keizer Elementary Schools Third Graders testing "Proficient" was 26%.

Dolly Parton Imagination Library

Free, high-quality books for children from birth to age five, no matter their family's income.

- One book is mailed in the child's name each month, age birth to 5, NO COST to the family.
- Age-specific reading tips for parents
- Book themes: love of reading and learning; regard for diversity of people; promotion of selfesteem and confidence.
- Audio and Braille books available

2022

197,460,315 Books Gifted Since Inception.

• The number of books gifted in 2022 was 24,708,008. This was an overall 11.56% increase over 2021 and equals 2,567,700 additional books gifted. (This equates to a book mailed every 1.27 seconds).

Breakdown by country for books gifted:

USA: 23.362.946Canada: 463,190

United Kingdom: 604.963

Australia: 203.999

Republic of Ireland: 72,910

Over 24 million books gifted in 2022

A 11.56% increase over 2021 (Equates to 1 book mailed every 1.27 seconds)

Books are mailed from Dollywood.

Locally started the program, here in July 2022 and currently cover 97301, 97306, 97317, Keizer, Aumsville, Independence and Falls City. Other participating communities include: Silverton, Jefferson and Santiam Canyon. Have 2,000 Children signed up in our area so far.

Have received donations from the Creekside Rotary Club and \$1.7M from the state legislature.
