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State Revenue Sharing

- Oregon's State Shared Revenue program for alcohol is funded by the sale of distilled spirits; liquor licensing fees; and taxes on beer, wine, and cider.
- 34% allocated to cities.
 - 20% distributed based on population "State Alcoholic Beverage"
 - 14% allocated to cities as "State Revenue Sharing"
- 14% portion distributed to cities using a formula that factors in property taxes, population, and income.





State Revenue Sharing FY 2025 Projection \$2,330,270

- 6.6% increase in FY 2025: State Shared Revenue Report published by the League of Oregon Cities (2024)
- Cities will receive less to fund Legislative approved expansion of OLCC warehouse.
- Revenues from the State Shared program are anticipated to <u>decrease</u> from the current year budget \$44,110, or 1.9%.



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Revenue Uses

- First of two Public Hearings.
 - First for possible uses
 - Second for proposed uses
- State Revenue Sharing funds are unrestricted.
- Can be used as an offset to property tax levy for General Fund operating budget.
- Historically used to offset the costs of Police Patrol in the General Fund.



Next Steps & Recommendation

- Receive testimony on possible uses of State Revenue Sharing funds.
- Staff Recommendation:
 - Recommend to City Council that revenue received from the State Revenue Sharing program be used to offset costs in the General Fund associated with Police Patrol

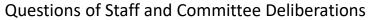
