7:00 PM Meeting called to order by Vice Chair Eli Brody.*

*Chair Mike Beringer and Land Use Committee Chair Ian Johnson were not at tonight's meeting as they were at the Land Use Hearing regarding changing zoning of portions of the North Campus from Public and Private Health Services to Single Family and Multi-Family Residential.

1. Welcome, Introductions, Announcements, Approval of Minutes: Eli Brody, Vice Chair

Eli welcomed all in attendance and invited everyone to introduce themselves and tell where they live. A motion to approve the meeting minutes of the March 16 was made and seconded. Motion carried.

2. Police Officer Report:

No report this evening.

3. City Councilors' Reports:

No councilors were available to attend tonight's meeting. Councilor Chris Hoy submitted a written copy with Citywide Updates, added to these minutes as an attachment.

Eli mentioned that next Monday the City Council will be discussing the current library book purging that has been halted due to citizen concerns. If this is a topic of interest, people may want to attend.

5. Committee Reports:

 a.Land Use Ian Johnson No report

- b.Transportation Julie Redden
 - I. To date the ADA upgrades to the D Street overpass have not yet been made.
 - II. The speed check on 23rd has been completed but has yet she has not received any information. She will check on this.
 - III. Traffic issues on 25th. Marilyn Moritz mentioned that neighbors on 25th are wondering about the possibility of speed bumps. Julie noted that the process to get the speed bumps is quite an involved process. There is cost involved but amount is not known. The speed bumps installed previously were paid for with a grant. Julie said that neighbors actually need to be the ones to call and then follow through. The more neighbors who call, the sooner there may be a resolution.
 - IV. Semis (18 wheel) on Park Avenue. Teri Lupoli asked how to go about having signage limiting trucks to local delivery only due to the difficulty for large trucks to enter and/or turn off of Park Avenue. Eli said that while the streets are City streets, it is ODOT who is in charge of controlling issues like this as well as setting speed limits.

V. Pedestrian Safety

- Pedestrians wishing to cross the street must first signal their intent by stepping off of the curb, at which time motorists are supposed to stop. Just standing on the curb does not indicate intent to cross.
- b. Pedestrians are also cautioned to NOT believe there is actual safety by being in a marked cross walk. Vigilance is always required.

c. Be aware that cars are driving in the "escape" (or turning lane) even though they are not supposed to. Pedestrians are cautioned not to use that lane as a "safety" island unless it is marked as such.

c.Parks

Eli Brody & Marilyn Moritz

- I. Eli reported that he recently took a drive around to look at our neighborhood parks and he thought everything looked quite good.
- II. Michael Brown again mentioned the issue of grocery carts not being picked and that the stores are not doing their job. Michael suggested that perhaps a city ordinance needs to be prepared that would require stores to do their job.
 - a. Eli suggest that Michael and others need to gather a group together to go to City Council with this issue.
 - b. It was also suggested that Michael contact Ian Johnson and mention this as a topic of concern for the NESCA Newsletter and for an entry on the Facebook page.
- III. Englewood Park is planning another festival on August 10. Organizers are looking for interested vendors, artists, etc.

6.Business - Other:

I. Hawthorne Street Cleaning Project

- a. The next street cleaning project is scheduled for May 25, 8:30 AM. Meet at the Park & Ride east of the Holiday Inn, entrance at the north end of the lot.
- b. Marilyn Moritz reported that she had made calls to try to find out who is responsible for sweeping the parking lot in order to clean up the cigarette butts. After several calls, it was determined it is Cherriots' responsibility as they own the lot.

II. Motorhome Issues

- a. Michael Brown mentioned a motorhome that parks by McDonald's on 39th. The person living in it moves it during the day time but then parks it there at night and sleeps in it. He is wondering what, if anything can be done.
- b. Eli said that it is potentially a Code Enforcement issue. Other than that, there are no vagrancy laws and vehicles, including motorhomes, can park on city streets as long as they are moved at least once every 72 hours.

III. <u>Panhandling</u>

Due to current laws (or lack of) there is very little that anyone can do about panhandling other than to ignore and not participate by giving panhandlers money. Eli stated that he is aware that it is a problem but, again, due to the lack of vagrancy and loitering laws, there is little police officers can do.

IV. Community Development

Cynthia Burgeson, Community Development Coordinator with Foreign Links Around the Globe (FLAG) is looking for families interested in hosting an exchange student for the next school year. V. NEN & Grant Neighborhoods

Recent Council Meetings

- Last night we held a work session to hear a report from the Sustainable Services Revenue Task Force
 - The task force recommended an operating fee (addition to water/sewer bills), employee-paid income tax and gas tax to fill the \$8 Million gap between revenue and services.
 - Council moved all 3 recommendations forward for further consideration. There is a lot more work to be done before council decides which, if any, of these ideas to pursue.

- Urban Renewal Agency: Purchase and Sale Agreement for the sale of real property located at 4075 and 4107 Fisher Road NE to Redwood Crossings, LLC for low barrier housing to help with the hardest to house population

UPCOMING COUNCIL MEETING(s):

- Work Session 4/22 (prior to council meeting) to hear information regarding the Continuum of Care structure. This is the mechanization by which the city receives federal money for housing. For many years, we were in a local continuum of care, but for some reason (still a mystery to me why) local authorities decided to join an organization that encompasses virtually all but the largest cities in the state. This decision has not served us well.
- Library Collection policy review will occur at the 4/22 meeting. Council
 may either affirm practice of weeding books, continue the hold on the
 current practice or decide to go a different direction. I have received a
 lot of community input on all sides of this issue.


