Fresh Start Market

7:00 PM Meeting called to order by Mike Beringer, NESCA Chair.

1. Welcome, Introductions, Announcements, Approval of Minutes: Mike Beringer

Mike welcomed all in attendance and introduced his guest, Gary Oliver. Going around the room, everyone introduced themselves and told where they live. A motion to approve the minutes of the May 21 meeting was made and seconded. Motion carried.

2. Police Officer Report: Officer Mike Tangney

1. Officer Tangney discussed Crime analysis information. Hot weather has seen an increase of A/C window inserts being installed without adequate security, making access to homes quite easy. Petty criminals are seeming to be bolder lately by using this means of access, sometimes during the day. As previously mentioned, leaving garage doors open (even a small opening for cats to come and go) is also being exploited, even at times when the homeowner is at home in the backyard, etc.

2. Last month the POP Team (Problem Oriented Policing) was discussed. Officer Tangney reported there is no direct line with which to contact them as they take calls from patrol that allows street patrols to better serve more serious crime issues.

3. If there are issues of transients camping on property or squatting in homes, it is helpful for police to have information on who owns the property or at least a specific location/address.

4. A problem house at 1485 25th St NE was brought to his attention at last meeting and patrols have been paying attention to the location. They have even had contact with people at the address and they are aware they are being watched. At this point, there is little else that can be done but it will continue to be monitored.

5. If anyone sees suspicious activity or persons, they should call THEN, not later. Provide Dispatch with as much information as is possible regarding location, number of individuals, any vehicles, etc. As always, call the non-emergency police number anytime there are questions or concerns or call 911 if there is someone on your property and you feel they are a potential threat.

6. Eli Brody, NESCA Street Cleaning Coordinator, mentioned to Officer Tangney that at our last clean-up project we found many used needles at the Park & Ride and that some of the somewhat secluded areas have basically become public toilet areas for transients.

3. Code Enforcement: Officer Wolfe

- Officer Wolfe introduced herself as our new area Code Enforcement Officer, previously a 911 Dispatcher. In reference to Eli's comment about the needles at the Park & Ride, Office Wolfe said that we can call non-emergency fire about needles and they will retrieve them.
- There were 44 new cases in our area this past quarter, with only 12 still open. She said that our area is actually one of the quieter areas for required enforcement activity. There is currently only one derelict house at 1195 Park Avenue NE which appears to be in process of demolition. There have been some reported abandoned cars.
- There was a question about any known rat issues, but issues seem fairly vague.
- Due to staffing levels, there is no one available to physically answer telephone calls. Officer Wolfe asked everyone who calls to leave a detailed message. There is an on-line complaint form which all were encouraged to use. A "cheat sheet" on how to report a problem is attached to these minutes.
 - There was a question as to whether this is also available in Spanish. As Officer Wolfe wasn't sure, Teri Lupoli will contact Irma Dowd at the City to see if it is also in Spanish. If not, she will request that one be made available.

4. City Councilors' Reports: Chris Hoy

- **City Water.** The water is **SAFE** regardless of what is being said by individuals on social media who are not connected with the city or the water department. There IS algae bloom (there always is some) but last year was the first time that it even impacted Salem's water. Steps and procedures were put in place at that time that worked. There is now daily testing and results are available to the public online. Ozone filtration, one of the best ways to keep water clean, will be added to help with purification. It is a bit expensive to install but once in place, the long-run costs are less.
- **City Budget.** The budget situation is not good. The proposed budget forwarded by the City Manager cut 3 positions, but the Council overrode that and put the positions back. The budget income is not keeping pace with increased population demands. Two needs: 1) fill budget holes and 2) keep pace and add police/fire. In the next fiscal year, the city will be \$8m in the hole without new revenues. A question was asked why there is such a shortfall and the answer was that it goes back to Measure 5 property tax limitation bill that was passed 20 years ago.

Possible sources of new revenues under consideration are:

- Operating fees to fill the gap: \$10 for single family homes, \$30 for businesses, \$tbd for multi-family housing.
- Employee payroll tax of .03% to keep pace. This would include employees of all employers (state, city, private, etc.). Salem has many individuals who work here and use City services but who do not live here, so pay no taxes towards those services. The City Council is looking at some type progressive/graduated rate that will not hurt those already struggling on minimum wage paying jobs.
- Gas tax. By law this would need to go to voters whereas the others could be enacted by ordinance.

There will be more conversations at the next City Council meeting on July 8.

- **Cycle Share.** Bike sharing is being launched on 6/22 at 1 PM at NE Church and Chemeketa. There will be a number of stations around town with the hope to expand further.
- **Fisher Road Completion Date:** There is no date known at this time. Chris will check on it and report back. Information will be added as an addendum to these minutes.
- **25th Street Construction Project:** Question was asked if the current construction on 25th at the North Campus is related to the North Campus project or if it's a City project. Marilyn spoke with the work crew and was told it is a sewer project. Chris will also check on this and report back. Information will be added as an addendum to these minutes.

5. Enlace: Amador Aguilar

- The annual combined Enlace/NESCA neighborhood event will be held at Thorp Park on July 26, beginning at 5 PM. Everyone is encouraged to come, bring a dish for the potluck table, and enjoy the music, entertainment, and spend time meeting and visiting with neighbors.
- Amador mentioned the various activities that Enlace is involved with and the various cultural connections within the community.

6. Committee Reports:

- a. Land Use Ian Johnson
 - Ian was unable to attend this evening. No report.
 - Mike did note that the North Campus Planning Commission appeal period has passed and the decision on the ruling for rezoning, requested by Mountain West, is final.
- b. Transportation Julie Redden

- Julie was unable to attend this evening. No report.
- c.Parks Eli Brody & Marilyn Moritz
 - Marilyn reported that the Salem Leadership Foundation approved a matching grant for two chemical toilets for the Enlace/NESCA event in July. The matching grant was approved for \$125.00. The NESCA Board needs to match the foundation's funding. The full cost for one toilet will be \$149.00 which includes the same-day pick up. As a result, Marilyn will redo/amend the request to \$74.50.
 - A motion was made and seconded for Marilyn to redo/amend the grant request to \$74.50 (down from \$125) for the purpose of paying for the chemical toilet for the 7/26 Enlace/NESCA Thorp Park event. Motion passed.
 - An additional motion was made and seconded to approve the additional \$100.00 from NESCA funds for contingency should other expenses arise. Motion passed.
 - Eli thanked Marilyn for her efforts in getting the Salem Parks Foundation approval of the grant for the information kiosk for Hoover Park as well as the grant for the chemical toilet for the Enlace/NESCA festival.
 - The question was asked if NESCA would like to set up a table at the Englewood Forest Festival scheduled for the second Saturday in August. More discussion will be needed at next month's meeting.
- d.Hoover School Liaison Teri Lupoli
 - Anyone who wishes to begin picking up school supplies should do so now. Teri will gladly accept any that you purchase even though they won't be delivered to the school until after the school year begins.
- e.Watershed Gary Pullman
 - Gary was unable to attend this evening. No report.

6.Business - Other:

- National Night Out
 - August 6. Mike invited everyone to attend the potluck held on Illinois Court off Monroe. There is usually a firetruck for the kids, city council participation, and a lot of really good food.
 - Marilyn suggested inviting Alternative Services Group. Mike asked her to do so.

Mike thanked everyone for attending this evening. **Our next scheduled meeting will be July 16.** There being no additional regular meeting business, Mike closed the meeting at 8:00 PM.

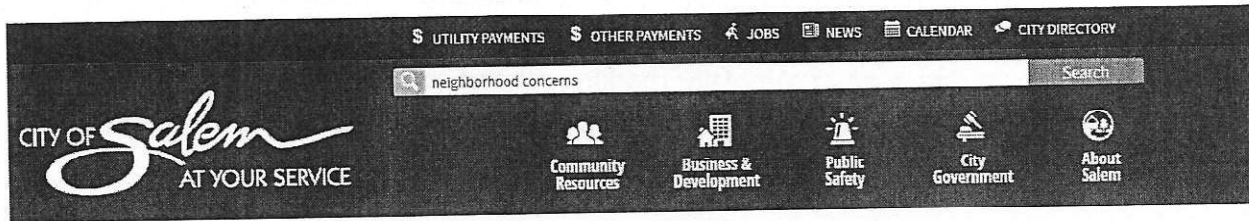
Addendum to Minutes for June 18, 2019 NESCA Meeting
